

CURRICULUM POLICY

INTRODUCTION

Our School's curriculum is all of the planned activities that we organise in order to promote learning, personal growth and development. Adcote aims to offer a broad and balanced range of educational experiences that will encourage students to develop a sense of responsibility for their community and their environment, whilst discovering and stretching their individual academic, creative and sporting talents.

Adcote wants pupils to grow into positive, responsible young women who can work and cooperate with each other while, at the same time, developing their knowledge and skills in order to achieve their true potential and prepare for a successful life in the 21st Century.

We value the breadth of the curriculum that we provide and aim to use it to foster confidence, leadership, engagement, achievement and resilience in our pupils, following the CLEAR Learning initiative. Above all we believe in providing each pupil with a sense of their own worth within a safe, caring environment and the opportunity to reach or exceed their expectations.

The syllabus for each academic subject is planned in accordance with the National Curriculum and the skills and content are broadly in line with the National Curriculum and are updated to reflect changes in this document when appropriate. The Primary Framework is a key resource. There is specialist teaching in Art, Textiles, ICT, MFL, Music, Drama and PE throughout the Junior School. Swimming is a weekly taught subject in the Autumn term.

Teaching in Juniors is largely form-based, in small class sizes. Form and Specialist Teachers are supported by Teaching Assistants in some lessons as appropriate. A full programme of termly visits is organised for each class to support the curriculum. In addition to this, there are residential visits for Year 6.

YEARS 7 TO 9 - KS3

The whole curriculum is taught by subject specialists and, for the most part, in subject based classrooms to make full use of departmental resources.

There are two parallel forms of approximately 10-14 in each year groups 7 and 8, and three forms in Year 9 with approx.18 students. The curriculum offers a very broad and balanced curriculum and an emphasis on taking part in a wide range of activities and on learning how to be part of a community. All

students use laptops to support their learning. As students go up the school there is an increasing programme of cross-curricular ICT delivery, encouraging students to see their skills as tools to a further end.

English, Maths and the three Sciences teach their GCSE courses over three years, starting in Year 9. This allows more time to cover the specification in more depth.

YEARS 10 AND 11 - KS4

Years 10 and 11 are the GCSE years. All students study a common core of English, English Literature, Mathematics, and Biology. All take, in addition, up to five optional subjects, chosen from Art, Business, Chemistry, Drama, Food Preparation and Nutrition, Geography, History, IMedia, Music, PE, Physics, Spanish and Textiles. All students have PE and PSHE, which includes a comprehensive study skills programme. Girls choose between Wayfarers and CCF in Year 10, with guided study provided in Year 11. Students may also choose a twilight subject of a two year GCSE in Astronomy, Photography or Further Maths. At both GCSE and A Level, our aim is to give students a free choice of subjects, rather than requiring them to choose from groups of subjects as dictated by the timetable.

Pupils who enter Year 11 to complete GCSEs in one year take compulsory English and Maths and a selection from the sciences. Other subjects are possible if the pupil demonstrates a secure background and knowledge in the subject.

YEARS 12 AND 13 - KS5

The small Sixth form teaching groups foster friendly and supportive relationships between staff and girls. Subject choices include Art, Biology, Business, Chemistry, Drama, Economics, English Literature, Geography, History, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology, and Textiles. Girls have the opportunity to follow additional courses to supplement their A Level studies. We currently offer one year courses in CMI Level 3, and The Extended Project Qualification (AQA), and a variety of half-term short courses. All pupils in the Sixth Form follow the enrichment programme. In addition, all pupils take PE in a sport or physical activity of their choosing. A wide range of activities is on offer from aerobics to CCF.

Furthermore, Adcote's challenge days provide a platform for students to explore and celebrate all disciplines of the arts, ensuring a comprehensive creative education.

For a small school Adcote School prides itself on the breadth of our curriculum for all ages, in particular the range of subjects offered at GCSE and A Level, and our uptake of STEM subjects in the Sixth Form is significantly above the national rate for girls.
